



Current Threat/Themes

- In the previous 12-month period intelligence has been received of potential labour exploitation occurring within care homes in Edinburgh, Lothians, Falkirk, Glasgow and Ayrshire.
- The nationalities of potential victims involved are Indian & African.
- The nationalities of potential exploiters involved are Indian, African and British.
- Most potential offences identified are in respect of documentation and immigration offences.
- Police Scotland also are aware of a fictitious company based in Scotland that has recently been used by 15 Nigerian applicants as previous employer details for visa applications in respect of employment within care homes across England.

Intelligence Gaps

- Lack of reporting from victims due to immigration status.
- Lack of visibility of staff control of income, accommodation, food and working conditions by the exploiters.
- Little known of the recruitment agencies and facilitators supplying many of the workers and their level of complicity. Significant cross-criminality with fraudulent activity further hampering the intelligence picture around the main benefactors.
- Lack of incident reporting regarding risks to residents from the exploitation of untrained, unvetted workers.

Looking Forward & Methods how to Report

- Improved information sharing and partnership working: Care Inspectorate, NHTU engagement, Scottish Business Resilience Centre, Home Office. GLAA, National Minimum Wages Team
- Further roll out of Partners Intelligence Portal.
- Continued awareness raising of HT indicators in the financial sector for early notification of potential exploitation.
- Mechanisms for safe reporting disseminated to care staff and residents / their families.
